Diabetes requiring oral medication:

Initial report to the FAA (minimum 60 days on a stable medication program then):

1. Please provide a current status letter from the treating physician to include: an assessment of risk factors for coronary heart disease, a clinical examination that includes Blood sugar readings.
2. A summary of ALL medications used with dosages, and a statement regarding any side effects, or end organ damage (such as renal, ophthalmological, neurologic, or cerebrovascular), AND a statement regarding any episodes of hypoglycemia.
3. A RECENT HGB A1C
4. Lab report with blood sugar, lipid profile, BUN/Creat
5. The pilot must be on a stable does regiment of medication for a minimum of 60 days before the above report and lab is prepared

If diabetes was previously reported to the FAA

1. Please provide a current status letter from the treating physician to include a recent HGB A1C. This lab test should be done every 3 months to assure good control.
2. A letter from treating physician that includes any side effects from medication, list of medication with dosages, any evidence of end organ damage.
3. **Any change in medications** requires a 60 day acclimation and an updated note and Hgb A1C be sent to the F.A.A. Medical Certification Division for clearance before exercising the privilege of the Special Issuance.
